The Massachusetts Legislature: Democracy in Decline

A brief review by Patti Muldoon

If you want to understand the situation our state legislature is in, I highly recommend reading "The Massachusetts Legislature: Democracy in Decline." The report was just released in November, 2021. This is the first clear accounting I have seen of why it is so difficult to reform the legislative process or to even get a bill passed through the legislature. The review, a project convened by Progressive Democrats of Massachusetts, points to House management and a lack of professionalism and transparency as leading causes.

Former Rep. Jay Kaufman, who used to represent part of Arlington and whom I deeply respect, is one of the authors. He concludes that we have to elect reformers to challenge today's House leaders in their own districts. Under the current system, which has evolved since 1977, reform from within by current Representative members cannot work.

League Members Welcome Town Manager at Holiday Party

Adam Chapdelaine, Arlington's Town Manager, spoke to a small but enthusiastic group of members and family members on December 1 at the League of Women Voters of Arlington's annual Holiday Party, which was once again a virtual event instead of our accustomed potluck.

Co-President Angela Olszewski noted that Adam had last been our guest at the 2010 Holiday Party, when he was the new Deputy Town Manager. He became Town Manager in 2012.



Adam gave us an update on his work this year. First among his priorities for almost two years now has been the pandemic. Vaccine uptake in Arlington has been excellent, and he was looking forward to getting back to normal until the Delta variant hit. Now, the Omicron variant was making things hard to predict. He was proud that Arlington 5-to-11-year-olds had the highest vaccination rate in the state, almost 90%. He credited Christine Bongiorno and the town's Health and Human Services department with making the vaccines available, and Arlington's parents for taking advantage of them.

Next has come the allocation of funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), passed last March. Federal funds are the province of the Select Board and the town administration. The \$35 million from ARPA is about equal to the annual budget of the town (not including the schools). The town has been getting advice from the federal treasury and feedback from the public on how it can and should spend the funds. Some funds are already being spent, and other spending is being planned. For more details, see https://www.arlingtonma.gov/Home/Components/News/News/11406/16. The main areas are

- Public health: Nurse staffing, behavioral health, the Arlington Youth Counseling Center
- Premium pay for essential workers in the public and private sectors
- Equity outreach to underserved communities, including translation services
- Behavioral health

as follows:

- Food security (Arlington EATS)
- HVAC systems in school and town buildings
- Park and playground improvements
- Water and sewer infrastructure
- Homelessness, notably on the Mugar site
- Affordable housing (\$8 million), for Menotomy Manor improvements and others
- Rent and mortgage assistance
- Small business assistance

Adam is also working on other major town priorities:

- The NetZero Action Plan has the goal of reaching net zero carbon emissions by 2050.
- Connect Arlington is a plan for sustainable transportation to reduce car use and also improve safety for cyclists and pedestrians (for example, the improved Mass. Ave./ Appleton St. intersection).

Holiday Party (Continued)

- **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion**: Jill Harvey, the director, started right before the pandemic and is working with many town commissions on social and racial justice issues.
- **Building projects**: The High School is on schedule and on budget, and the first phase will open early in 2022; the Department of Public Works yard renovations have begun, but are being delayed because of supply issues (the High School ordered everything very early, long before the pandemic); the Central School renovations as a Community Center are also delayed but with the hope of finishing soon.
- The town budget: They are thinking about an override for fiscal year 2024, while trying to limit expenses on the town side (for the schools, pandemic needs have raised costs); the pandemic has depressed school enrollment, however, which may lower costs if this trend continues.

Adam then answered questions on the following topics.

- **Remote work**: The town has made remote work possible for employees, although most are in the office now, and is working on a hybrid plan.
- **Buses**: The 77 bus is extremely unreliable, with delays of up to 50 minutes, making students late for school, among other problems. Adam is working with Rep. Garballey to find out what is going on. Connect Arlington doesn't work without reliable buses.
- Water/sewer funding: The new funds may reduce town budget costs, but many are additional; they may be able to prevent or reduce cost increases for taxpayers. A member noted that the maintenance backlog has improved, that sewer system work helps reduce MWRA costs, and that overflows along Alewife Brook Parkway have been reduced.
- **Mugar property**: The conditional approval by the ZBA could be appealed by abutters or the applicant; we should know by the end of December. The ZBA permit reduces the number of units considerably and restricts most to age 55+, so the impact will be smaller.
- Council on Aging: There is no specific allocation of ARPA funds to the COA, but we do have room to meet needs for nursing and social workers.
- Open space: ARPA clearly allows work on active open spaces (playgrounds) but is ambiguous on passive ones. We are prioritizing playgrounds, which have been heavily used during the pandemic.
- Solar panels: ARPA does not include support for these, but the infrastructure bill should. We won't get direct federal funding through this bill, but the state legislature will be providing funding from this bill to support Complete Streets, sewer work, and the like in the next 4-6 months.
- Facilities: A member asked Adam to thank the facilities director for maintaining the Visitor Center in the Center, using it for holiday popups.




