
Update on the LWVUS Agricultural Study

LWVMA has posted a toolkit for the agriculture study at http://lwvma.org/member-resources/toolkitsfor-members/lwvus-agriculture-update-toolkit/. It includes a particularly helpful guide that lists each consensus question followed by the relevant background documents that LWVUS developed which deal with that question topic. Several Leagues are holding public forums on issues raised by the LWVUS agriculture study and they invite other interested League members to come.

LWV Andover/North Andover plans a forum **Saturday, March 1**, 2 to 4 p.m., at Andover Memorial Hall Library, 2 N. Main St., Andover. Three area farmers will speak: Lisa Colby of Colby Farm, Newburyport; Glenn Cook of Cider Hill Farm, Amesbury; and Rich Bonanno of Pleasant Valley Gardens, Methuen.

LWV Newton will present "The Politics of Food: You Are What You Eat" **Wednesday, March 12**, 7:30 to 9 p.m. at the John M. Barry Boys & Girls Club of Newton, 675 Watertown St. in Newton. Speakers are Steve Goodwin, Dean of the College of Natural Resources at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst; and Greg Maslowe, farm manager, Newton Community Farm.

LWVUS notes that all Agriculture Update materials including the update papers, Leaders Guide and online response form are posted on the LWVUS website and Leagues are encouraged to meet and submit consensus forms by the deadline of April 18, 2014. LWVMA Day on the Hill Focuses on Advocacy

"Advocacy: Beacon Hill and Beyond." That's what we'll be talking about at LWVMA's annual lobby day at the State House **Wednesday, March 26**. Same-day registration starts at 9:30 a.m. with the program from 10 a.m. to noon in the Gardner Auditorium. New this year is the chance to pre-register (see below).

State Auditor Suzanne Bump will outline her office's work overseeing the government and will offer suggestions on how Leagues can effectively approach executive branch agencies to deal with issues.

Sen. Eileen Donoghue of Lowell will talk about the effort in Lowell to allow 17-year-olds to vote in city elections and discuss ways Leagues can work in neighboring cities which don't have Leagues. She'll tell us what kinds of opportunities are available in cities such as Lowell and Lawrence and who to call if a local League wants to help.

And, of course, our legislative specialists will be describing the specific bills pending in the legislature to discuss with your Senators and Representatives after the program. A packet with all the information you will need will be emailed shortly before the lobby day. Personal visits from constituents are extremely important in getting legislation passed, so please bring as many people as you can to talk to your legislators.

This year we are offering you the chance to pre-register for Day on the Hill. Just visit http://lwvma.org/day-on-the-hill-2014/ to let us know you are coming. When you RSVP, the LWVMA office will notify your Senator and Representative that League members from their districts will stop by between noon and 1 p.m. so you don't have to make an appointment.

If you decide to come at the last minute and haven't pre-registered, you are more than welcome. The more people who attend, the louder our voice is on the Hill.

Remembering the Ladies

Cokie Roberts, a contributor to National Public Radio's Morning Edition and political commentator for ABC News, will celebrate the contribution of women in American history as part of a forum sponsored by the Pioneer Institute, a public policy research organization. LWVMA is a co-sponsor of this exciting program.

"Remember the Ladies: Women in U.S. History, Literature and Schooling" will be held at the Omni Parker House in downtown Boston **Monday, March 24**, noon to 3p.m. The forum is free and open to the public, but reservations will be required. The LWVMA will post information on reservations on its website as soon as it is available.

Roberts, author of two books, *Founding Mothers* and *Ladies of Liberty*, about women during the Colonial and Revolutionary eras, will discuss the role of women in American history.

The other keynote speaker is Valerie Boyd, biographer of the African-American writer, Zora Neale Hurston.

The keynote speakers will be followed by a panel of historians, academics and experts on K-12 education.

Forum on Family Homelessness

LWVMA is a co-sponsor of the tenth annual Forum on Family Homelessness to highlight the problem and explore solutions. The forum is **Sunday, March 2**, from 3 to 5 p.m. at the Trinitarian Congregational Church, 54 Walden St., Concord. It is free and open to the public.

The keynote speaker is Aaron Gornstein, undersecretary of the Department of Housing and Community Development. Other speakers will be Kelly Turley, director of legislative advocacy, Mass Coalition for the Homeless, Sen. James Eldridge and Rep. Ken Gordon.

Sixteen homelessness prevention organizations will have information available on ways individuals and organizations can help deal with a record number of families in shelters and motels each night.


