#### Directions to Meredith's House:

Andrews Way is a new street and is not on Mapquest, so please use the directions below. If you use Mapquest, type in "42 Old Colony Rd.", which brings you to Andrews Way. (Google Maps puts you a block away.)

From the west end of Arlington, turn onto Overlook Rd., at the Summer St. traffic light across from the skating rink. Keep to the left at the fork and travel about 1/2 mile to Ridge St. Turn right on Ridge St., then first left on Cherokee Rd., first right on Old Colony Rd., and first right on Andrews Way. Andrews Way is a short street that looks like a driveway. I Andrews Way is directly ahead on the left. You may want to park on Old Colony Rd. Come in through the garage if you prefer not to climb the stairs to the front door.

From Arlington Center, travel on Mystic St. towards Winchester and take slight left on Old Mystic St. (about 3/4 mile north of Summer St.), then 2nd left onto Hutchinson Rd, 2nd left onto Morningside Dr., 1st right onto Windmill Lane, first left onto Old Colony Rd., and 1st left onto Andrews Way; see directions in italics above.

## LWVA Warrant Article Recommendations For 2011 Annual Town Meeting

Before each annual Town Meeting LWVA decides which warrant articles to support or oppose. A committee researches the articles to determine their intent and possible consequences for Town governance. They also determine whether there is a relevant League position or principle. They then choose approximately fifteen to twenty that they feel are most important to the League and for the Town to recommend to the LWVA board. The board makes the final decision. This year's committee was Ann FitzGerald, Pat Lieberson, Phyllis Maddox, Nancy Sweeney and John Sweeney.

The League of Women Voters of Arlington **supports** the following Warrant Articles to be considered at the Annual Town Meeting beginning April 25.

The League supports Articles 11, 19, 33, 34, and 66, which are concerned with protecting and enhancing the quality of our natural resources. Article 11 would strengthen Arlington's wetlands protection by-law, which was inadvertently weakened at last year's Town Meeting when the new FEMA flood plain map was adopted. Article 19 increases fines for unleashed dogs. Article 33 allows wireless antenna leases for certain approved parks and open spaces, with the revenue raised to be used for maintenance and improvement of parks, playgrounds and open space. Article 34, the Pay-As-You-Throw trash collection program, would lead to an increase in recycling and reduction in the town's trash disposal costs. The funds provided for in Article 66 would contribute to the Water Bodies Fund for maintenance, treatment and oversight.

The League supports Articles 21, 22, 39, 44 and 45, which would lead to more effective and efficient town governance. Article 21 would allow the Annual Town Meeting warrant to remain open longer. Article 22 would allow a voice vote instead of a standing vote under certain circumstances at Town Meeting. Article 39 would authorize the Selectmen to sell the Crosby School. There is a desirable qualified buyer available. The proceeds could be used to help fulfill the town's promise to voters to rebuild all of the elementary schools. Articles 44 and 45 would consolidate the town and school human resources departments.

The League also supports the **intent of Article 24** to make public documents readily available to members of the public. However, fees should be set to reflect only the actual cost to the town. Having a maximum fee of \$50, as the article is written, may not be monetarily adequate to process some requests. A system should be created to supply the documents in a timely manner that doesn't unduly hamper town employees in the performance of their other duties.

The League supports Articles 41 and 42. They would replace brick curb cuts, sidewalks, crossings, and the entrance to the senior center to enhance citizen safety and accessibility.

#### **LWVA Warrant Article Recommendations (Continued)**

The League **opposes** the following articles:

The League opposes Articles 13 and 14, which would reduce affordable housing requirements in urban renewal areas and eliminate them in assisted living facilities.

The League opposes **Article 25**, which would prohibit "municipal employees", which includes part-time elected or volunteer board and committee members, from accepting anything of value from anyone with whom they have official dealings. Arlington relies heavily on the services of the many volunteers who are members of the nearly fifty boards, committees and commissions that contribute to the governance of the town. One of the League's primary goals is to promote citizen participation in governance, which this article would effectively hinder.

The League opposes **Article 30**, which would remove original labor service appointments from the provisions of civil service. This article defeats one of the main purposes of the civil service program, which is to remove political influence from government hiring practices.


