# Arlington League Hears from Food Link Leader at Annual Meeting


At the LWVA's Annual Meeting June 13, the guest speaker for our program for the evening was DeAnne Dupont, the Director and co-founder of Food Link (<a href="https://www.foodlinkma.org/">https://www.foodlinkma.org/</a>), an organization based in Arlington that collects high-quality fresh and prepared foods that would otherwise be wasted from local grocery and prepared food stores, and delivers them to over 30 social service agencies serving people in need in 14 greater Boston communities.


Ms. Dupont amazed the group with the growth of her enterprise in 7 years and all that they do to serve Arlington and the communities in the greater Boston area. They now have 4 staff employees and are renovating a building to house their operation. 125 volunteers collect 15,000 pounds of food a day, 7 days a week, 363 days a year. This food provides over 400,000 meals annually, with half of the food staying in Arlington. They estimate that they help over 5000 people in 14 communities. Their slogan is: "Rescue Food. Nourish Our Community." How fortunate Arlington is to have Food Link and its many workers in our community.

Later, the group heard from members who'd attended the State Convention. At the business meeting, members voted to include six new positions on the Arlington Housing Authority in our local program. Many thanks to Meredith and Joe Zona for hosting the meeting.



# Bill McKibben Addresses Urgency of Climate Change at LWVMA Convention

Bill McKibben, environmentalist, founder of <u>350.org</u>, author of "The End of Nature" and the newly released book "Falter: Has the Human Game Begun to Play Itself Out?", gave the keynote speech to the annual convention of the League of Women Voters of Massachusetts on June 7.



He spoke about bringing a young poet, Kathy Jetnil-Kijiner, from the Marshall Islands, currently at one meter above sea-level, to meet another young poet, Aka Niviana, from Greenland, whose one-mile-thick ice sheets are in the process of melting. They hiked onto the ice to recite a poem they composed together about the devastation their homelands are experiencing from the changing climate. While in Greenland they actually beheld a massive ice shelf fall, causing forty-foot waves in the ocean, while on the other side of the planet, Kathy's people are abandoning their homes in the Marshall Islands.

We are all experiencing the consequences of climate change close to our homes, from the Paradise fire to the greatest floods yet recorded in the Mississippi River. These events are occurring from an increase of 1.8 degrees F and we are still on track to see a total increase of 6-7 degrees F. Last year we had the highest increase in greenhouse gas emissions so far, of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  parts per million (ppm), to bring us to 414.87 ppm, way beyond the 350 ppm that we can safely have in the atmosphere.

And yet, McKibben talked of hope, as there is better knowledge of what we can be doing. Solar panel and wind costs have decreased by 90%, and if we go all out, improving the technology and working towards a Green New Deal, we can start to reverse the amount of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere. For many years McKibben asked himself, "Why aren't we doing it?" He had thought for a long time that we were engaged in an argument to change minds, even though there was scientific consensus.

With the release of Exxon scientists' reports showing that they knew about the effects of green-house gases on the climate decades ago, it was clear that the real fight was about money and power. Naomi Oreskes, author of "Merchants of Doubt," who also attended the event, wrote a critical history of this political coverup. Exxon had even built their oil drilling rigs in anticipation of sea level rise while they were sowing seeds of doubt in the public to halt any political action to stop the warming. So McKibben realized that both sides have known the truth for over 30 years, and one side was lying about it.

President George H. W. Bush was ready to "fight the greenhouse effect with the White House effect," according to McKibben, and yet here we are, 30 wasted years later, after a long campaign of disinformation slowed down any action. He said that we aren't fighting ignorance, but are up against big money and power. For that, we need a movement, similar to what we have seen in the past from the suffragettes, the union movement, Gandhi, and Martin Luther King. Ten years ago, he and some students started 350.org, which has resulted in over 5200 rallies and demonstrations, in over 180 countries, all over the globe.

# McKibben on Climate (Continued)

Unfortunately, McKibben realized, "We don't have 50 years to change hearts and minds and grow this movement." So now, he says, we must "couple education with confrontation." He pointed to the Keystone pipeline fight that started eight years ago, which was halted after four years of confrontation, but then permitted to continue by the current President. Last week, however, the company delayed building the pipeline for one more year. McKibben also spoke about the movement to divest from fossil fuel companies, which is gaining in momentum. He also spoke about the group "Extinction Rebellion," which shut down London and helped pass the first "Climate Emergency" resolution. McKibben is also feeling hope from the energy behind the Green New Deal and the Sunrise Movement, here in the United States.

And finally, he encouraged us to listen to 16-year old Greta Thunberg, inspiration for the climate school strikes, who is calling for the adults to support the activism of the students. To this end, Bill McKibben encourages us all to walk out of work or school and into our communities and streets, calling for a general Climate Strike on September 20, 2019.

McKibben said, "We can't negotiate between human beings and physics." Building a movement isn't easy, but we must do it.

# **State Convention Report**

I attended the LWV of Massachusetts 2019 Convention on June 7 and 8 in Westford with Colleen Kirby and Patricia Muldoon. The premier excitement was about the 100th anniversary, in 2020, of the ratification of the 19th amendment giving women the vote. The Women's Suffrage Celebration Coalition of Massachusetts, which includes the LWVMA, has information about events they have organized at <a href="https://suffrage100ma.org">https://suffrage100ma.org</a>; the first event was on June 25 at Faneuil Hall in Boston. Many Leagues are well into their planning to celebrate the anniversary. The second premier excitement for me was that the new Civics Bill, passed recently in Massachusetts, that inspired two Leagues to hold "Civic Bees," and had much excitement engaging students. They brought stand-up posters which were lively, fun and inspiring to look at.

The delegates voted to support a well-crafted Climate Emergency resolution; by the show of hands, and by the cheers, it looked unanimous. There was anger and frustration all weekend about how slowly work was going on about climate.

I knew no one but I was soon comfortable talking and learning. I was charmed by a talk on how we could make ballots more fun. Actually, no, probably not, but it was a catchy idea to keep us listening. A sizeable group of delegates were vocal about gun control and well organized for a march, and women were wearing orange, the color for the parade and movement.

Over 6000 bills are filed annually in the Massachusetts House and Senate. It is not intuitive how to track bills on the state website, so State Senator Rebecca Rausch of Needham has posted instructions on her website. Here is the link:



## **State Convention Report (Continued)**

Other League projects included greeting new citizens; training citizens how to run for office; training town meeting members how to present their issues so they would be more effective; a musical with campaign songs from George Washington's time; getting power lines underground; and getting citizens to get it in their heads that primaries are not just nice exercises but important and why. Needham involved high school and middle school students in a "GoGreen Needham Exposition" with table displays.

There were also projects to register voters, young, adults and new citizens; holding debates; teaching citizens to use websites for info about health care, women's health, education, housing, and tenant rights; work on immigration and safety for immigrant families; and lobbying and working to make funding for charter schools and issues of a foundation budget more transparent.

Delegates voted down the idea of changing the League name by removing the word Women. The question was put forward by the LWV of Cape Ann.

# **State League Urges Climate Action**

From the League of Women Voters of Massachusetts

We are pleased to announce LWVMA is an official sponsor of the Boston Youth Climate Strike, set for Friday, September 20th! The Strike is being organized and led by youth, and youth leaders are asking for our help. Please register to participate in the Youth Climate Strike on September 20th, share information about the Climate Strike and the event registration link widely within your networks, and stay tuned for more specific details as they develop! The Strike is a global effort powered by youth of all ages from around the world, with hundreds of students striking on Fridays since March to bring meaningful attention and political action on the climate emergency confronting us. These youth are asking for our help as adults. LWVMA is doing its part to support their effort as part of the larger plan of action described below.

At the June LWVMA Convention, League members unanimously supported a Climate Emergency Resolution. To begin acting on the resolution, the LWVMA Environmental Action and Advocacy Committee developed a plan of action, approved by the LWVMA Board on July 26, 2019.

The plan, available at <a href="https://lwvma.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/08/Climate-Emergency-Plan.pdf">https://lwvma.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/08/Climate-Emergency-Plan.pdf</a>, sets two immediate goals of developing a detailed mobilization plan, including proposed actions at both the state and local levels, and developing a communications plan.

To meet the goals, the committee is offering seven specific actions for state and local Leagues to work on, including supporting the Global Climate Strike on Sept. 20, asking local governments to adopt climate emergency language, including climate emergency questions at candidate forums, and developing ways to raise awareness of the climate emergency issue within our membership and throughout our communities.

As part of the climate emergency action plan, the committee drafted Sustainable Practices Guidelines, available at <a href="https://lwvma.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/08/Policy-Sustainable-Practices-for-Leagues-V2.pdf">https://lwvma.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/08/Policy-Sustainable-Practices-for-Leagues-V2.pdf</a>, for the League at both the state and local levels to consider in their planning and operations. The guidelines encourage implementation of zero waste and low-waste practices at League events.
