LWVMA Begins "Meet the Specialists" Programs

On August 25 and 26, I attended Zoom programs on criminal justice and election reform sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Massachusetts (LWVMA). These were highly informative one-hour events that informed us about the bills to which LWVMA has given highest priority for the current legislative session. Watch for announcements of more programs.



Criminal Justice Reform

On August 25, League Specialists Nancy Bettinger and Lucy Costa described three bills that the League is particularly focused on passing, of nine that it supports:

- Solitary Confinement, H.2504/S.1578, which would provide criminal justice reform protections to all prisoners in segregated confinement. Sponsored by Reps. Liz Miranda and Lindsay Sabadosa and by Sen. Jamie Eldridge. Arlington Reps. Sean Garballey and Dave Rogers are co-sponsors of the House bill. - Raise the Age, H.1826/S.920, which would raise juvenile justice jurisdiction gradually over five years to include young people from 18 through 20 years of age. Sponsors are Reps. James J. O'Day and Kay Khan and Sen. Joseph Boncore. Reps. Garballey and Rogers and Sen. Cindy Friedman are all co-sponsors. See https://www.raisetheagema.org/ for more information.
- Parole Eligibility, H.1797, which would give all incarcerated people the opportunity for a parole hearing after 25 years, effectively converting sentences of life without parole (LWOP) to life in prison. Massachusetts has far more people serving LWOP sentences than any nearby state. Sponsors are Reps. Liz Miranda and Jay Livingstone. Elections and Voting

On August 26, League Specialists Nancy Brumback and Linda Freedman described four bills that the League is particularly focused on passing. The LWVMA is working with the Election Modernization Coalition, which includes a large number of advocacy groups.

• **VOTES Act**, H.805/S.459, which would, among other things, make permanent many of the changes put in place for the COVID-19 pandemic: Sponsors are Rep. John Lawn and Sen. Cynthia Creem. Reps. Garballey and Rogers and Sen. Cindy Friedman are all cosponsors. 

Meet the Specialists (Continued)

- Support for Parents Running for Office, H.769/S.475, which would allow child care related to campaigns to be allowed as a campaign expense. Sponsors are Reps. Mike Connolly and Joan Meschino and Sen. Pat Jehlen. Rep. Rogers is a co-sponsor.
- FARE Act, H.3547/S.2261, which would make public transportation free on statewide primary and election days throughout the state. Sponsors are Reps. Frank Moran and Chynah Tyler and Sen. Joseph Boncore.
- Protecting the Voting Rights of Eligible Incarcerated People, H.836/S.474, which would require officers at correctional facilities to make voting information and materials, including absentee ballot information, readily available to eligible voters who are in pretrial detention or serving misdemeanor sentences (in case these provisions are dropped from the VOTES Act). Sponsors are Reps. Chynah Tyler and Liz Miranda and Sen. Adam Hinds. Reps. Garballey and Rogers are co-sponsors.

It is particularly urgent that the VOTES Act be passed this fall so that it will be in effect when the current emergency provisions expire. The bill went to the Senate Ways and Means Committee in July, an important step. See page 7 for details.

The League also supports H.825/S.485, which would provide a local option for ranked choice voting (RCV) in municipal elections. Arlington's Town Meeting voted in favor of RCV, but the legislature must pass a home rule petition for it to go into effect. This law would allow towns and cities to adopt RCV for local elections without having to file a home rule petition.

In Memoriam: Bette Pinckney and Abigail Fair

Bette Pinckney, a member of the League of Women Voters of Arlington for well over 50 years, died January 27 on Cape Cod at the age of 97. We remember her for her tireless advocacy on behalf of the expansion of Robbins Library, which was finally completed in 1994. The Library's fourth floor board room has a plaque in her honor. Unfortunately, we can't find an obituary that would provide more information.

Abigail Fair, who had been a member of the LWVA since 2013, died on May 17 at the age of 81. A longtime resident of New Jersey, she played a major role in protecting that state's freshwater wetlands as a planning board member and town official. VOTES Act Advances in State Senate

From the State League

Voting rights advocates, public interest groups and a network of state and local organizations praised the July 19 decision by the Massachusetts Legislature's Joint Committee on Elections Laws to send the VOTES Act to the Senate Ways and Means Committee, the first step in bringing the comprehensive voting bill up for a vote.

The VOTES Act will make several permanent changes to Massachusetts' election laws, including: allowing voters to vote by mail without an excuse; expanding early voting options; establishing same day voter registration; ensuring that the Commonwealth joins the 30-state Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) to keep voter registration rolls up-to-date; implementing risk limiting audits, the "gold standard" of post-election audits; making sure that eligible voters who are incarcerated are able to request a mail ballot and vote; and more.

The VOTES Act is strongly supported by the Massachusetts Election Modernization Coalition, an umbrella group working to modernize the Commonwealth's election laws.

"The League of Women Voters applauds the election laws committee for moving quickly to position the VOTES Act for a vote. It is important for the legislature to pass a permanent, comprehensive voting bill to assure full access by all eligible citizens and continued smooth functioning of our election process," said Patricia Comfort, Executive Director, League of Women Voters of Massachusetts. "At a time when too many states are restricting voting access, we are proud of the direction our legislature is taking."




