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VOTE411 Is Live!

From the State League

VOTE411.org, our online voters' guide for the 2022 Massachusetts elections, is now live!

The guide covers all candidate races from U.S. Congress down through statewide races as well as all contested county races. The guide also covers the Massachusetts Governor's Council races. We will be adding information about the general election ballot guestions soon.

We worked diligently to encourage candidates to respond to the questionnaire. We plan to continue our outreach to urge those who haven't responded to do so as soon as possible.

VOTE411.org also includes all of the up-to-date information and deadlines for the recently enacted "VOTES Act" law so that you can plan how and when to vote.

In order to promote informed and active participation by all Massachusetts voters in this election cycle, LWVMA is reaching out to influential libraries, schools, and nonprofits across the state for help publicizing our guide.

This nonpartisan voters' guide is a unique and vital tool to educate and engage voters, but it's powerless unless people know about it.

As always, the election information provided by the League is nonpartisan; we never endorse or support parties or candidates. We hope you will help us share this valuable tool to encourage voters in your community to make informed choices as they go to the polls this fall.

LWVMA Council 2022

Patti Muldoon and Kim Haase attended the League of Women Voters Of Massachusetts Council June 11. Kim edited this report from Patti's notes.

The Council consisted of a business meeting followed by a fascinating panel discussion.

BUSINESS MEETING

The LWVMA Strategic Plan, set in 2021, aims to empower voters and defend democracy. The following projects will help implement these goals:

- Building a culture of philanthropy (a part-time fundraiser has been hired)
- Gateway Cities pilot: programs in Lynn, Brockton, and New Bedford should help with diversity goals
- School Civics celebration project: a civics curriculum is now required for students in grades 8 through 12, thanks in part to League efforts; we'll celebrate what students are doing statewide, and 5 local leagues are showcasing their towns' work
- Advocacy: to increase access to ballot for all and evolve as a coalition partner with communities of color, we advocated for and won the VOTES Act, which includes permanent voting by mail, a later voter registration deadline, jail-based voting — all we wanted except same day voter registration. We will file a bill for same day voter registration in January 2023.
- Building a culture of collecting, measuring and evaluating data to access impact

Karen Price of the Data Collection Committee reported that starting in 2022, the LWVMA has begun collecting information on local League activities. As of June 1, 97 activities have been recorded by 24 local Leagues (including Arlington).

Sharyn Roberts, Chair Nominating Committee, reported that half of the officers and directors are elected each year for a two-year term. She presented the 2022 slate, which was elected.

PANEL DISCUSSION

After the business meeting, we had a panel of two speakers, hosts of the podcast "What Works: The Future of Local News" — Ellen Clegg, a former Boston Globe Editor, and Dan Kennedy, both on the faculty at Northeastern.

The Facts

Gannett Publishing announced that they would be regionalizing all but 3 of the local newspapers they publish. (The *Arlington Advocate* has merged with the *Winchester Star*.)

2100 local newspapers have closed in the last 15 years. Many more are "ghost papers" with little reporting capacity. 600 journalists have lost their jobs in the last year alone.

Craigslist destroyed classified ads, taking away 40% of newspaper revenues. Facebook and Google, which charge tiny amounts for advertising, severely damaged both digital and print advertising. Corporate chains and hedge funds cut deeply into ownership.

Why This Matters

The First Amendment mentions freedom of the press free of government interference. Thomas Jefferson said that if he had to choose between democracy and a free press, he'd choose a free press. Studies show that local news is more trusted in a time of polarization. Trust is essential. A lack of news coverage has been shown to lead to more corruption. Democracy begins at the local level, but not without an informed citizenry. Local news reduces polarization. We now have news deserts, though news organizations are essential to community identity.

Not Making It In Massachusetts

Gannett has closed its local newspapers and isn't putting local news online. In the first half of 2022, information has deteriorated radically. Some municipalities have independent online resources. Dan Kennedy is on a state committee on local news, which had just started meeting. They will see what state government can do.

Independent news organizations, producing public interest journalism, are succeeding in some towns.

The *Bedford Citizen* was founded as a volunteer project by three LWV members who were unhappy with Gatehouse/Gannett coverage of their community. Now the editor and a halftime reporter are being paid competitive salaries.

The Patch, originally owned by AOL, is now owned by a hedge fund. In its model, one full-time journalist is responsible for 8-10 communities. Now it often is the only thing a community has. It would need a much higher level of staffing to meet our needs. MassLive.com also needs more staff. TapInto.net (in four states) could be a franchise model.

Media Literacy

We have an ongoing need for education on how to evaluate media stories. Objectivity is under attack today. Methodology should not be biased; it should take a snapshot of the best version of the truth. Objectivity is a fair-minded search for the truth. It doesn't mean balance: if someone says the sun rises in the east, you don't need someone else to say it rises in the west. Assisted living facilities need media literacy. Older people are often the ones sharing fake stories.

Kathy Colwell and ACMi

Kathy Colwell's family held a celebration of her life June 12, which was facilitated by Patti Muldoon. Several LWVA members attended, and some spoke fondly about their memories of Kathy, who died in March (see the April *Bulletin* for some members' recollections).

Jeff Munro, operations manager of Arlington Community Media, Inc. (ACMi), was unable to attend but sent his recollections of her work with ACMi, of which she was a founder and tireless advocate.

As Manager of ACMi, and working for Arlington Cable Access prior to incorporating, I had so much respect for Kathy's legacy with our organization in town. I learned so much about the Town and about the people, the dynamics, and navigating the politics. As a town meeting member and active producer in town, she knew everybody, and it really helped with keeping the local TV content fresh.

Kathy was so important to my understanding of Arlington's version of community television and its impact on the participating members and on the viewers at home. There were parents, students, artists, and elected officials, all trying to communicate from both sides of the camera. Kathy exemplified community action, telling her story of dragging large cameras and record decks to community meetings, long before it was expected, all to provide the sense of transparency, reminding elected officials their responsibility was to the public who elected them. This story and others taught me that this community cares about action, cares about the responsibility of what we do here at ACMi. Kathy was our best cheerleader for our cause and sent countless citizens with a story to share to ACMi, sent even more to the channels to watch the programming.

Kathy was part of so many firsts at our station. She started our first website, helped purchase our first digital camcorder and laptops, and helped build and test-drive our first ever edit suites. I could go on, but I will say Kathy and Bill's constant support provided ACMi with the foundation on which all that stands today.

My longevity here at ACMi has a lot to do with the love and friendship of Kathy and the original founders of ACMi. Kathy was an active volunteer member for many years, and she continued to lug cameras around for years; thankfully, they were smaller and lighter. She eventually bought her own cameras and edit suite, so I saw her less and less; she would stop into my office to say hi before meetings. Kathy was always willing to share and support great ideas, but more impactful was her willingness to serve and provide the action where and when it was needed!
