Mark your calendars: Arlington Candidates' Night is Wednesday, March 27 at 7:30 p.m., in person in Town Hall. The event will also be broadcast live on ACMi and shown on cable several times before the election. As always, the LWVA and Envision Arlington co-sponsor the event.



There will be informal sessions with candidates for Town Meeting from 7:30 to 8 p.m. Starting at 8 p.m., there will be question-and-answer sessions with the candidates for town-wide offices: Select Board, School Committee, Board of Assessors, and Housing Authority.

As we did last year, we will be asking people to submit questions for the candidates in advance, to be selected by volunteers from the LWVA and Envision Arlington. We expect the Town to provide information about how to submit questions soon.

We also need volunteers for the following positions:

- **Timers**: We need at least four volunteers to keep time during the question-and-answer session, and to hold up time cards to keep all candidates within time limits so everyone gets a fair chance to speak.
- **Greeters**: We need at least two volunteers to greet people arriving at Candidates' Night and provide information about the League.
- **Set-up/Take-down**: Help us to put up precinct signs and get other items organized for the event or take down and pack up when the event is over.

Presidential Primary Information from the Secretary of the Commonwealth Website

The 2024 Massachusetts Presidential Primaries will be held on **March 5, 2024**. In addition to candidates for President of the United States, the ballots will also include the party offices of state committee and ward or town committee.

State Committee (Man and Woman) (https://www.sec.state.ma.us/divisions/elections/getting-on-the-ballot/how-to-run-for-state-committee.htm)

Each party's state committee is allowed to elect one man and one woman from each of the Commonwealth's 40 state senate districts. Members of the state committee work to:

- Promote the aims of the party
- Work in cooperation with the national party committee and with ward and town committees
- Organize and work for the nomination and election of party candidates

Ward or Town Committee (https://www.sec.state.ma.us/divisions/elections/getting-on-the-ballot/how-to-run-ward.htm)

In Massachusetts, ward and town committees are the building blocks of political parties. In towns, party town committees are elected town-wide. In cities, party committees are elected by voters in each ward.

Ward and town committees range in size from 3 to 35 elected members. Their duties include:

- Representing their party at the local and neighborhood level
- Promoting the objectives of the party
- Working for the nomination and election of party candidates.

Local Environmental Group Reports Progress on CSO Bill

The environmental advocacy group Save the Alewife Brook, https://savethealewifebrook.org/, reports that a bill that would help alleviate sewage pollution in Arlington and elsewhere has been favorably reported out of the Joint Committee on Environment and Natural Resources. The bill is H.886, An Act Relative to Combined Sewer Overflows (CSOs), https://malegislature.gov/Bills/193/H886.

The co-sponsors of the legislation are State Representatives Dave Rogers (D-24th Middle-sex), who represents part of Arlington, and Adrian Madaro (D-1st Suffolk). Rep. Sean Garballey (D-23rd Middlesex), who represents the rest of Arlington, is also a supporter. The co-chairs of the Joint Committee on Environment and Natural Resources are Sen. Rebecca Rausch (D-Norfolk, Worcester and Middlesex) and Rep. Daniel Cahill (D-10th Essex).

The bill specifies that "by Jan. 1, 2035, in the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority sewer service areas ... there shall be no untreated Combined Sewer Overflow in any 25-year 24-hour storm event or smaller storm event." Also, "Within 18 months, the Department of Environmental Protection shall adopt regulations to implement this Section that shall include, but not be limited to, the definition of a 25-year 24-hour storm event ..."

The next step for the bill, the group says, will be a referral to another committee, most likely the House Ways and Means Committee.

Save the Alewife Brook's website notes that the Alewife Brook is a tiny water body in comparison to Boston Harbor and the Charles and Mystic rivers. But although most of the harbor and river sewage discharge is treated, none of the sewage discharged in the Alewife Brook by the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA), Cambridge, and Somerville is treated.


The group also states, "The current permitted limit for sewage pollution in the Alewife Brook is 7.29 million gallons per year. In 2021, 51 million gallons of untreated sewage pollution were dumped in the Alewife Brook."

Save the Alewife Brook is a grassroots environmental group with supporters in Cambridge, Arlington, Somerville, Belmont, and Medford.

H.886 is not one of the bills selected for advocacy by the League of Women Voters of Massachusetts (see https://lwvma.org/advocacy/league-supported-legislation-2-2/), but it is obviously of interest to Arlington residents.
