#### In Memoriam: Jane Howard, 1937-2024

Jane Howard, a member of the League of Women Voters of Arlington for almost 50 years, died September 7. She was one of Arlington's most active and distinguished citizens for many years, as a Town Meeting member and a co-founder of Vision 2020 (now Envision Arlington).

Two events will be held in Jane's memory on October 6: a remembrance at Keefe Funeral Home, 5 Chestnut St., from 1 to 4 p.m., and a reception at the Jason Russell House, 7 Jason St., from 4 to 6 p.m.

Some LWVA members have memories of Jane:

Janice Bakey: Jane Howard was a pillar of our Town. She was involved in or led so many projects for the improvement of our community. For example, she was a leader in Vision 2020, the Annual Town Survey, the Human Rights Commission, the schools, overrides, and our libraries.

She believed everyone should volunteer to help and was driven to involve as many residents as possible, and she was meticulous in getting a job done right. She will be sorely missed.

Meredith Zona: Back in the early 1990s, LWVA was actively involved in incorporating recycling in Arlington's curbside waste pickup program. I hand-delivered a letter to then-Town Manager Don Marquis at his home. This letter obligated LWVA to pay for the cost of printing, and then dropping off, a notice about the upcoming recycling program, with assistance from non-LWVA members, to every residence in Arlington, excluding apartment buildings. Jane and her husband Pete were very interested in the proposed recycling program, and I remember going to their home to personally tell them about the letter to Mr. Marquis; they were very pleased.

Carolyn Parsons: It was my first night as a newly elected Town Meeting Member. I was prepared. I had read all of the initial and subsequent reports from the various town committees. All of the information was in a loose-leaf binder and labelled for easy access. I had looked over the warrant and made notes. Having arrived from a side door, I sat behind Jane and Pete Howard. Opening remarks were made and we sang the national anthem. Jane turned around to greet me and asked if I had checked in and if I had gotten the latest updated material from various committees or individual Town Meeting Members on the back table. I was not prepared.

## **LWVMA Takes No Positions on 2024 Ballot Questions**

From the State League

The League of Women Voters of Massachusetts is "taking no position" on Ballot Questions 1-5 for the November 5, 2024 election. This means that League members may participate in Yes or No campaigns for Ballot Questions 1-5 as individuals but should not do anything to make the public think that LWVMA or a Local League has endorsed a Yes or No campaign.

Local Leagues may hold informational forums on these ballot questions and LWVMA is happy to partner on these as we did in 2022.

#### **How Does The Board Decide?**

#### **Question 1: State Auditor's Authority to Audit the Legislature**

Ballot Question 1 would give explicit authority to the State Auditor to audit the Legislature.

Transparency is a key tenet of the League. The League has worked for the public's right to know and for broad public participation in government as a necessary component of decision-making at all levels of government since its founding. LWVMA believes in an effective state government with a strong executive branch with lines of authority and responsibility clearly defined. It also believes in a strong and highly visible legislative branch that maintains its traditional role as a democratic forum.

However, LWVMA takes no position on Ballot Question 1 because existing law does not authorize it and it may be unconstitutional. The proposed "audit" is defined to include "information regarding active and pending legislation, the process for appointing committees, the adoption and suspension of legislative rules and policies and procedures of the Legislature." In a letter from the Attorney General's Office (AGO) dated November 3, 2023, citing the Massachusetts Constitution and Massachusetts General Laws, she concluded that the State Auditor does not currently have the authority to audit the legislature without the Legislature's consent. Additionally, the proposed audit may violate the separation of powers doctrine. Citing the relevant statute, the AGO letter states "Section 12 directs the State Auditor to audit the "accounts,"

programs, activities and functions ... of all departments, offices, commissions, institutions and activities of the commonwealth ..." (emphasis added). "The key question is whether the Legislature is a 'department' as that term is used in Section 12.10. Applying well-established rules for interpreting statutes, we conclude that it is not." (see pages 3 & 4)

The AGO letter further states "An unqualified auditing power sufficient to audit the Legislature over its objection would be difficult to reconcile with the powers vested exclusively in the Legislature by various parts of Chapter 1 of Part II of the Massachusetts Constitution, and protected from encroachment by Articles 21 and 30 of the Massachusetts Declaration of Rights." #### Question 2: Elimination of MCAS as High School Graduation Requirement

Ballot Question 2 would eliminate the requirement that a student pass the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) tests in order to receive a high school diploma.

The League believes the state Board of Education should set minimum educational standards for local public school systems with reasonable criteria for implementation and it should also provide services to assist local schools and to motivate them to improve the quality of education.

LWVMA believes members would need to reach consensus on an alternative to MCAS before deciding to support or oppose this ballot measure and therefore takes no position on this question.

#### **Question 3: Unionization for Transportation Network Drivers**

Ballot Question 3 would provide transportation network drivers with the right to form unions. The League has no positions on this topic, so LWVMA takes no position on this question.

# **Question 4: Limited Legalization and Regulation of Certain Natural Psychedelic Substances**

Ballot Question 4 would allow people aged 21 and older to possess and use certain natural psychedelic substances within specific parameters. The League has no positions on this topic, so LWVMA takes no position on this question.

#### **Question 5: Minimum Wage for Tipped Workers**

Ballot Question 5 would gradually increase the minimum hourly wage an employer must pay a tipped worker to 100% of the state minimum wage over five years.

While the LWVUS Meeting Basic Human Needs position includes support for a living wage, it also states, "Specific issues in relation to a living wage and income levels should be decided by Leagues working in their communities." LWVMA believes members would need to study and reach consensus on this issue and therefore takes no position on this Ballot Question.
